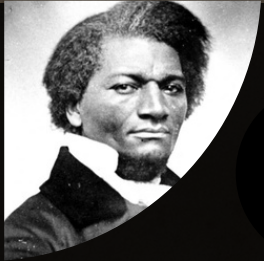


Reaching **Communities Across

Through Partnerships with cities connected to Frederick Douglass, such as Washington, D.C., Rochester, NY, Baltimore, MD, and Bedford, MA, we will create a tourist exchange program that brings African American history to life. The Cultural Center will own a charter bus for this purpose.

About the Grace Brooks Building

Located on the site of the Talbot County Health Department on South Street in Easton, Maryland, the Grace Brooks Building will serve as a vital hub for the African American community, offering a wide range of services, programs, and educational opportunities for people of all ages.

A Multifunctional Space

1st Floor: Cultural & History Center

Explore the rich history of African Americans through exhibits, archives, and multimedia presentations. Our center highlights the experiences of African Americans locally and nationwide.

2nd Floor: Education and Empowerment

- Lecture Hall: Host lectures and workshops on African American History and culture.
- Small Business Incubator: Support African American entrepreneurs and foster economic growth.
- Trade Programs: Focused on providing skills and career training to youth, including a youth flight program.

3rd Floor: Administrative & HBCU Satellite Offices

- Administrative Offices: Guiding the mission and growth of the society.
- HBCU Satellite Offices: Strengthening ties with HBCU's to increase opportunities for local youth.

Basement: Healthy Foods Program

- A program aimed at helping families make healthy food choices, combat food insecurity, and promote wellness within the African American community.

Programs For Growth & Inspiration

Youth Trade Programs

Empowering the next generation through hands-on training in trades such as carpentry, electrical work, and aviation (youth flight program), fostering entrepreneurship without the burden of student debt.

Mobile Cultural Center

Bridging the rich history of the Hill Community to schools across the nation through a mobile museum that celebrates African American culture and history.

Healthy Foods Initiative

Encouraging healthy eating habits within the community by offering education and support to families in need.
